Lesson 5: Entertainment Choices Toolbox

Ephesians 5:3-4, 7-17: But sexual immorality and all impurity or covetousness must not even be named among you, as is proper among saints. ⁴ Let there be no filthiness nor foolish talk nor crude joking, which are out of place, but instead let there be thanksgiving. . . . ⁷ Therefore do not become partners with them; ⁸ for at one time you were darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Walk as children of light ⁹ (for the fruit of light is found in all that is good and right and true), ¹⁰ and try to discern what is pleasing to the Lord. ¹¹ Take no part in the unfruitful works of darkness, but instead expose them. ¹² For it is shameful even to speak of the things that they do in secret. ¹³ But when anything is exposed by the light, it becomes visible, ¹⁴ for anything that becomes visible is light. Therefore it says, "Awake, O sleeper, and arise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you." ¹⁵ Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise but as wise, ¹⁶ making the best use of the time, because the days are evil. ¹⁷ Therefore do not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is.

The short answer to the question is that it is not a sin to hear God's name taken in vain. God hears it a billion times a day and sees every sin committed on the planet, the most outrageous, gross, unjust, wicked, defiled — he sees them all. And God never sins in seeing them...That's not the issue. That's just not the issue.

The enjoyment of being entertained by sin is the issue. I'll say it again: the enjoyment of being entertained by sin is the issue. Whether it's the sin of taking the Lord's name in vain; or the sin of cocky, self-exalting arrogance, which seems to permeate everything; or the sin

of lust and fornication and adultery and indecency and immodesty, which is virtually ubiquitous; or the sin of distortions of womanhood and manhood; or the sins of disrespecting parents; or the sins of drunkenness; or the sins of desiring to be rich, which Paul said we ought not to do; or the sins of dishonesty; or the sins of slandering with stereotypes; or the sins of simply, profoundly, ubiquitously ignoring and thus not glorifying or thanking God — whatever the sins, the issue is, What does it say about our souls that we enjoy being entertained by them?

1. Content Review Tools

Plugged In (https://www.pluggedin.com/)

Offers reviews of movies, TV shows, music, and games from a Christian perspective. Provides detailed content descriptions, including violence, language, and sexual content.

<u>Unique feature</u>: Includes a "Positive Elements" section that highlights positive messages in the content.

Movieguide (https://www.movieguide.org/)

Provides movie reviews from a more conservative Christian perspective. Offers detailed content descriptions, including violence, language, and sexual content, as well as moral and spiritual content.

<u>Unique feature</u>: Includes a "Content Chart" that rates movies on a scale of 1 to 10 for various content elements.

Common Sense Media (https://www.commonsensemedia.org/)

Provides reviews and ratings of movies, TV shows, books, and more, with a focus on providing information for parents and educators. Includes detailed content descriptions and age recommendations.

<u>Unique feature</u>: Offers educational resources and discussion guides for parents and educators.

IMDb (https://www.imdb.com/)

Offers a parental guide section for movies and TV shows on IMDb. Provides detailed content descriptions, including violence, language, and sexual content, as well as age recommendations.

Unique feature: Allows users to contribute their own content reviews and ratings.

Offers filtered streaming of movies and TV shows, allowing users to customize their viewing experience. Subscription prices start at \$9.99/month.

<u>Unique feature</u>: Provides a feature called "Watch Together" where users can watch movies with friends remotely.

Clearplay (https://www.clearplay.com/)

Allows users to customize their viewing experience by filtering out objectionable content from movies and TV shows. Web Browser Based. Subscription prices start at \$7.99/month.

<u>Unique feature</u>: Offers a wide range of customizable filters for different types of content.

Pure Flix (https://www.pureflix.com/)

Streaming service that offers a wide range of family-friendly and faith-based movies, TV shows, and documentaries. Pure Flix aims to provide uplifting and inspiring content that aligns with Christian values. Subscription Price: \$10.99/month or \$99.99/year

<u>Unique feature</u>: Offers a wide selection of faith-based and family-friendly content, including movies, TV shows, and documentaries.

Christian Cinema (https://www.christiancinema.com/)

Streaming service that offers a wide range of faith-based movies, TV shows, and documentaries, integrated across major streaming platforms: Apple TV, iOS, Android, Roku, Chromecast, Amazon Fire TV, and Fire Tablets. Subscription Price: \$9.99/month or \$99.99/year.

<u>Unique feature</u>: offers a "Church Screening" feature that allows churches and organizations to host screenings of select movies.

3. Parental Oversight Tools

Set screen and application time limits, remote device lock, app block/approval, website access and content filtering, camera/mic/location feature restrictions, device location indicator, etc.

These apps typically work through a difficult to circumvent platform by monitoring, tracking, and blocking the user's online behavior, and then generating reports or real-time alerts that are sent to designated accountability partners. The goal is to promote transparency and open communication about online habits, and to provide support and encouragement for positive behavior changes. Involves monthly subscription cost.

Blocks intrusive ads and improves browsing experience. Free.

Unique feature: "Acceptable Ads" where users can choose to see non-intrusive ads.

uBlock Origin (https://ublockorigin.com/)

Open Source software, Blocks ads and trackers. Free.

<u>Unique feature</u>: "Dynamic Filtering" which allows users to create custom filters.

AdGuard (https://adguard.com/)

Blocks ads and trackers. Subscription prices start at \$2.49/month.

Unique feature: "DNS filtering" which blocks ads at the DNS level.
