Open: Where might people typically store their treasured possessions?

Read & Discuss: 2 Corinthians 4:7-18

- 1. In verse 7 Paul says, "we have this treasure in jars of clay." What does he mean by this and how does this help illustrate his larger point that he's been making to the Corinthian believers? How does this truth "show that the surpassing power belongs to God and not to us"? How should this have practical applications on our attitude in presenting the Gospel message?
- 2. Paul creates a list of contrasts in verses 8 through 12. He begins with hard, but true present realities and contrasts each with a promise of hope.
 - a. First, take a minute to read aloud just the hard but true realities. Next, share some of your thoughts and reflections about this list. How have you experienced some of these?
 - b. Now read aloud the promises of hope in each of these verses. How does this second list encourage or comfort you?
 - c. How is the pairing of these hardships and promises helpful to us as believers? How would you encourage someone you're discipling to think about trials, hardships or challenges they experience when seeking to serve Christ?
- 3. Paul, like David, had faith in the purpose and faithfulness of God (v. 13). Paul also looked forward to the resurrection of all believers (v. 14). As a result, Paul continued to preach the Gospel in difficult circumstances. What helps you persevere in sharing the Gospel?
- 4. According to verse 15, what motivates Paul to see the grace of the Gospel reach more people? How has this motive been present in your own efforts to share the Gospel?
- 5. How would you describe the contrast Paul makes in verses 16-18? How have you experienced this to be true? How can we more consistently operate with the perspective that Paul has been describing in this passage?

Apply: What fears keep you from sharing the Gospel with others? What promises has God given us that serve as good encouragement to proceed in spite of those fears?

Pray: Pray that God would empower us to overcome whatever barriers we have in being bold proclaimers of the Gospel. Ask God to give us good reminders of His promises. Pray for one another by name that God would give us opportunities to share the treasure of the Gospel message with those who would receive it with joy.
