³⁹ In those days Mary arose and went with haste into the hill country, to a town in Judah, ⁴⁰ and she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. ⁴¹ And when Elizabeth heard the greeting of Mary, the baby leaped in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit, ⁴² and she exclaimed with a loud cry, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb! ⁴³ And why is this granted to me that the mother of my Lord should come to me? ⁴⁴ For behold, when the sound of your greeting came to my ears, the baby in my womb leaped for joy. ⁴⁵ And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was spoken to her from the Lord."

Personal Reflection or Group Discussion Questions

Open: What are some of your favorite Christmas songs? What makes these special to you?

Read: Luke 1:39-56

Discuss:

- 1. From what you know of Mary's encounter with the angel in which she was told she would become pregnant with Jesus (*Luke 1:26-38*), how might Mary have felt as she journeyed to see Elizabeth? How would Mary have been encouraged by Elizabeth's greeting? (vv. 41-45)
- 2. *Reread Luke 1:45.* In your experience, how does believing in the promises of God lead to us being "blessed"? What happens when we begin to doubt the promises of God?
- 3. What does it mean for your soul to "magnify the Lord" or for your spirit to "rejoice in God" (v. 46-47)? What are some practical manifestations of this in your own life?
- 4. In Mary's song (vv. 46-55), how does she describe God? How does she view her relationship with God? How does Mary's understanding encourage you? How could we take what we know of God and use it to encourage others, especially during the Christmas season?
- 5. Almost every thought in Mary's song can be found in the Old Testament. (For example, compare her song with Hannah's prayer in 1 Samuel 2:1-10.) What is the value in using Scripture in our prayers and praise to God? What are some familiar passages we might use?
- 6. In her song, what does Mary say the Messiah has done (will do) for the world? How have you seen Him do some of these things in your own life? What are some other wrongs or injustices you look forward to seeing Christ undo and make right?
- 7. Though it is clearly the Messiah who will bring justice and righteousness to the world, as Christ's followers, to what degree should we share in concern for these issues? (For example, see James 2:14-17 or 1 John 3:17-18.) What are you doing to address some of these issues?

Apply: Based on Mary's song, how would you summarize what we should be celebrating at Christmas? How can your Christmas celebrations reflect these truths?

Pray: Spend time praising God for His mercy and kindness. Ask Him to help us maintain an outward focus this Christmas as we commit ourselves to share in His purpose.
