- **Open:** What's an example of something you had hoped for that happened? What's an example of your hopes not being fulfilled?
- Read & Discuss: Romans 15:12–13
 - How would the message that the "root of Jesse" was to be a hope for the Gentiles have been surprising and significant (v. 12)? Being ruled by someone is not always seen as good news. What would make the Gentiles find hope in one who would "rule" them (v. 12)?
 - 2. What can we learn about the source of hope from verse 13? How have you experienced such hope? How might we share that hope with those walking through a season of disappointment?

Read & Discuss: Romans 8:18–25

- 3. What do these verses tell us about the relationship between sin and our longing? How would you explain the "hope" of believers depicted in verses 24-25?
- 4. What would result if we regularly adopted Paul's perspective in verse 18? What does it mean to "wait for [what is coming] with patience" (v. 25)? What makes it hard to hold on to future hope? Is it a contradiction to patiently wait (v. 25) while groaning inwardly (v. 23)? Explain.

Read & Discuss: Revelation 21:1–4

- 5. How would you describe God from the details contained within the passage? How is our relationship to Him portrayed in ways that offer us reason for hope?
- 6. From this description, what aspects of our future do you find particularly encouraging? How should knowing what's coming help us find hope in current disappointments?
- **Apply:** How might we help the unbelieving world see the hope Jesus offers them in their disappointment? What are ways we can encourage our fellow believers to have hope in God in the midst of their disappointments and struggles?
- **Pray:** Ask God to help us better root our hope in Him in the midst of a broken world. Ask God to provide courage for us to declare God's hope to others who are experiencing disappointment.
