Personal Reflection or Group Discussion Questions

Open: Share about a time when moving around in the dark led you to an undesirable outcome.

Read & Discuss: Ephesians 2:1-3

- 1. What feelings are stirred in you when you read this description of your life before Jesus saved you? What do Paul's words imply for those who do not follow Jesus but who feel they are "good people"?
- 2. What does it mean to be "children of wrath" (v. 3)? In order to fully appreciate forgiveness, we also need to recognize the weight of our sin. When sharing the Gospel, how might you try to explain how serious our sin is and why it deserves such severe consequences? How is understanding the weightiness of our sin meaningful to those who do know and trust in the Gospel?

Read & Discuss: Colossians 2:13-14

- 3. Have you ever had a debt forgiven? How did that feel? How did having that debt forgiven impact your life and what did it allow you to do?
- 4. In the case of verse 14, what was our "debt"? What do you think Paul wants us to understand from what he tells us God did with our "debt"? When sharing the Gospel with someone, what would you want them to understand about the nature of the forgiveness God offers us in Christ?

Read & Discuss: Ephesians 1:7-10

- 5. What does it mean in verse 7 when Paul says we have redemption? How is redemption in this context beautiful? How should the price of our redemption impact how we think about it?
- 6. In verses 7-8 Paul talks about the richness of God's grace. How would you describe the richness of God's grace to you specifically? How can we help others appreciate the richness of God's grace offered to them through the gospel?
- 7. Verses 8-10 describe the richness of God's grace toward those who believe. What do these verses tell us about the plan of God in Christ? How do these various factors impact your perspective on God's grace?
- 8. If all you knew of God was what we're told in Ephesians 1:7-10, what would you conclude about Him? From this description, what might be an appropriate response from us to God?

Apply: Have someone in your group read Psalm 32 aloud and then as a group respond in corporate prayer and praise in response to the beautiful truths that David illuminates for us.

Pray: Ask God for a deeper appreciation of His forgiveness. Ask for His help to fully walk in the new life we have in Christ.
